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




Book Signing and Lecture: DuPont Gardens of the



PARLIAMENTARIAN ROLE

Congratulations! You have been appointed to the position of Parliamentarian in your garden club.

The parliamentarian should be well versed in parliamentary law and the club's Bylaws and Standing Rules. The parliamentarian has the same duty as the chair to maintain a position of impartiality, and therefore does not make motions, participate in debate, or vote on any question except in the case of a ballot vote. He does not cast a deciding vote since that would interfere with the chair's prerogative to do so. If a member cannot forgo these rights in order to serve as parliamentarian, he should not accept the position.

It's very important to know that the parliamentarian is a consultant who advises the president and other officers, committees, and members on matters of parliamentary procedure, if requested. The parliamentarian's role during a meeting is purely an advisory and consultative one—since *parliamentary law gives to the chair alone the power to rule on questions of order or to answer parliamentary inquiries*. It is also the duty of the parliamentarian—as inconspicuously as possible—to call attention of the chair to any error in the proceedings that may affect the rights of any member or may otherwise do harm.

The president, knowing in advance the business to come before the members, should confer with the parliamentarian before the meeting opens, and during recesses, in order to anticipate any problems that may arise and to avoid frequent or obvious consultation during the meeting.

The parliamentarian should be seated next to the chair, so as to be convenient for consultation in a low voice. After the parliamentarian has expressed an opinion on a point, the chair has the duty to make the final ruling as to whether or not to follow the advice or to disregard it. The chair should avoid requesting the parliamentarian to speak to the members unless the matter is very involved.

Environment/Conservation Concerns

Delaware is making progress toward tackling climate change. In July, Gov. Carney signed important legislation to reduce carbon emissions 50% by 2030. These bills are designed to reduce greenhouse gas emissions:

- House Bill 99: Lays out targets to reduce net emissions by 50% by 2030 and 100% by 2050.
- House Bill 10: Sets targets for purchasing electric school buses.
- House Bill 11: Ensures large commercial buildings are equipped for solar installation.
- House Bill 12: Expands the Electric Vehicle Rebate Program
- SS 1 for Senate Bill 103: Amends Delaware code to make it easier to bring EV chargers into residential areas.
- Senate Bill 170: Commitment to study offshore wind with neighboring states and PJM.
- SS 1 for Senate Bill 7: Expands the Delaware State Energy Office.

Another environmental bill passed in June eliminates the use of polystyrene (Styrofoam) in food packaging. SB51 bans expanded polystyrene foam (EPS) and plastic picks, as well as making plastic straws available only upon request in Delaware dining establishments. The effective date of July 1, 2025, gives restaurants who have not yet already done so plenty of time to make the shift away from EPS and toward a future with less waste that is not recyclable.

What is DCCI?

<u>Plastic-Free Delaware</u> is promoting the Delaware Community Composting Initiative. Community composting occurs at a communal site and utilizes food scraps and yard waste from several residents or a nearby surrounding neighborhood. Community composting benefits include:

- Composting opportunities for people dwelling in multi-unit housing,
- Strengthening community relationships and partnerships,
- Replenishing local soils and gardens with nutrient-rich, locally made compost,
- Reducing landfill matter.

The Delaware Nature Conservancy: Protecting Land and Biodiversity

The Nature Conservancy (TNC) in Pennsylvania and Delaware announced in June 2023 that it has closed on the purchase of 7.5 acres to expand Ponders Tract at its Pemberton Forest preserve in Sussex County, Delaware. TNC will retain ownership of the new parcel, and the acquisition marks its first new land purchase in Delaware since 2004. Located within the Broadkill River headwaters, Ponders Tract serves as an important biodiversity refuge within the Delaware Bayshore landscape. The preserve acts as a critical stopover for neo-tropical migratory birds such as the black-and-white warbler and the ovenbird.



It has been a busy Spring and Summer for Duck Creek Gardeners!



Leadership of the museum, and members of Bobbee's family attended the rededication of the garden along with members of Garden Gate Garden Club.

In 2023, Garden Gate Garden Club members Anne Aleman, Elaine Hickey, Eda Ross Montgomery and Kelly Koontz met with museum staff to discuss ways in which we might continue to work together. Garden Gate offered to install plantings in empty beds beneath mature oak trees at the front of the building with no understory plantings. We added Sun King Aralia, Astilbe, Autumn Fern, Spiraea and two Redbud trees to add interest to the museum entrance. We also added landscaping to soften some fencing at the side of the building and around a mechanical area. We planted Cryptomeria, Green Arrow Cedar, Dragon Lady Holly, Caryopteris, Northern Sea Oats, Feather Reed Grass and Butterfly Bush. Over the summer, Garden Gate members volunteered to water the plantings.



Garden Gate applied for and received a \$4,160 State of Delaware Urban and Community Forestry grant to match our club's contribution of \$4,160, resulting in an investment of \$8,320 in this phase of the project.



Our Flower Show, 'It's Not Easy Being Green" was a huge success with 24 designs submitted and a whopping 95 horticulture entries. The #1 house plant entry was a gorgeous,

full purple gloxinia and the winning horticulture entries were (I to r) Syneilesis aconitifolia, Osmanthus Goshiki, and Hosta.

A new slate of officers was also introduced, with Laura Scanlan (L) as our new President and Kelly Koontz (R) as our Vice President.





The Spade & Trowel Garden Club in Seaford will kick off the year with a tea party and tour of the Master Gardener Demonstration Garden at the Carvel Research and Education Center in Georgetown. Each member will bring his or her own tea cup, saucer, plate and napkin.

Our first service project was removing suckers from crepe myrtles on the grounds of Seaford Public Library, scheduled Sept. 1. In October, we'll help students at Seaford High School make corsages to sell for homecoming, in conjunction with the Western Sussex Boys and Girls Club. It's a service project for us, a fund-raiser for the other two organizations.

We're taking orders for our pecan sale and keeping an eye out for places where we can collect greenery for our Greens Sale in December. These are our two major fundraisers.
