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President Message

Dear Garden Club Members,

I wish everyone a Very Happy, Healthy, Safe New Year! I hope you are all doing well and that this New Year will bring joy and happiness to everyone.

November 17th, 2021 was our first in person State meeting since November 2019. The meeting was held at the Modern Maturity Center in Dover. Attendance exceeded 100 members. Thank you to Garden Gate Garden Club members for hosting and providing the centerpieces which were made with recycled materials. We also had the pleasure of the company of Mary Warshauer the National Garden Club President. Mary spoke briefly on her theme "Plant America – Play Outdoors".

One highlight of the meeting was the remembrance of the dedication at the Memorial Garden for the Fallen at Dover Air Force Base which was held in May 2011. The DVD produced of the dedication was played continuously prior to the meeting. The garden is a private place for the families of the fallen. The DVD included pictures of the garden and important attendees. Joy Ericson who co-chaired the memorial garden project with Donna Curtis spoke of the Memorial Garden's history. Both Alice Witterholt (DFGC President 2009-2011) who initiated the Memorial Garden project and Regina Brown (DFGC President 2011-2013) who completed the project were recognized for their involvement in the Memorial Garden.

The main highlight of the meeting was the Delaware Flower Show Judges Council (DFSJC) program titled "Twisted Trash" presented by Dottie Howatt chairperson of DFSJC. The program presented simple designs constructed of recycled/repurposed materials suitable for table centerpieces at a State meeting. DFSJC challenged clubs to volunteer to host a DFGC meeting (April, June or November 2022). Each hosting club will receive \$50 from the DFSJC to help fund the centerpieces made with recycled/ repurposed materials. The three participating club's centerpieces will be judged. The winning club will be announced at the April 2023 State meeting and will receive \$100.

The trial DFGC State meeting registration procedure was a success and will continue. Registrations were made through the <u>dfgcregistrar@gmail.com</u>. A representative from each Club delivered the Club check to Joan Simon the DFGC treasurer. Joan sat near the registration desk collecting the checks. This process eliminates changes of contact information for every meeting.

Two NGC award applications were submitted and have been forwarded. Horticulture

In the middle of winter beautiful flowers in the garden are rare, but not totally missing. Usually in early February flower buds are popping if you know where to look. Under ratty, tatty semi-evergreen palm tree shaped leaves, the Lenten Roses are starting to bloom. Hellebores are about to begin their reign as Queen of the Garden before it warms. This is our time to crawl over the dried leaves and carefully prune away the hellebores' leaves from last year. It is best to snip stems off one at a time, to the basal rosette, making sure not to damage any new growth. Today, hellebores come in many colors and forms thanks to breeders and the plants own desires to share with each other.

> If you don't already have a collection of winter garden hellebores – please check them out at your favorite plant places.



Some people consider them pricey, but they are very long termed in the garden after a little special care as youngsters. All readily available species and varieties of hellebore prefer highly organic, woodland soil, i.e., lots of compost and leaf mulch. Plants fare best in morning or dappled light. Hot summer sun could stress them. Most love growing under deciduous trees. They will take some drought if well-established but should not be allowed to become overly dry in their first three years. Hellebore roots will rot if they are in soils that are constantly wet. Most experts do not consider hellebores as short-term container plants. They tend to suffer any time their roots are disturbed. Hellebores do not need artificial fertilizers but enjoy an annual side-dressing of leaf compost in late fall. Make sure not to cover the center rosette or rot may occur.





Hellebores can be a cut flower – BUT should never be cut before the seeds have been set. Individual blooms taken earlier do not last a day. Seed-set branches can be treated with one tablespoon flower preservative + two tablespoons ethanol + one quart warm water. Do NOT increase the ethanol!

Hellebores will bloom for a month or more but hold their form until their seed is ready. This fact tells why they are showy in the garden for about three months. Often the color of the blooms will fade to a soft green while holding their shape.



I hope you enjoy some of the different hellebore varieties I have photographed in previous years in my February Garden. The hellebore is Queen only until the spring ephemerals emerge. Enjoy each beauty in her turn.

> Environment/Conservation/Legislation Update Winter 2022

Legislation Updates

The Delaware Clean Water Trust oversees \$50 million in the fiscal year 2022 for water quality projects. The trust's strategic plan will be the major topic of discussion at the virtual public meetings,

as DNREC and the trust oversight committee seek input on the strategic plan through public comment. The committee was created by the <u>Clean Water for Delaware Act</u> to advise the Governor and the General Assembly, provide oversight of the Clean Water Trust account, and publish an annual report and strategic plan for clean water. The virtual public meetings were held Jan. 25, Feb. 2, and Feb. 10.

"A draft of a strategic plan framework is available at <u>de.gov/cwi</u> and will be presented at the meetings, but only as a starting point for public discussion. Public input and ideas are needed and encouraged to form the basis of the plan for Trust spending.

Clean Water Trust funding will touch almost every aspect of water quality improvement and water-related projects in the state including infrastructure for drinking water, stormwater, and wastewater; drainage programs; waterway management and beach preservation, and many other projects funded by state and federal resources such as the conservation reserve enhancement program, conservation cost-sharing and tax ditches.

The Clean Water Trust also collaborates with Governor Carney's Clean Water Initiative for Underserved Communities that is a major component of the Department of Natural Resources and Environmental Control's environmental justice work with the state's lowincome, disadvantaged and underserved communities."

To cut down on electronic waste, a *Right to Repair* bill was introduced in 2020. Several amendments have been added and the bill is still active. HB22 creates the Delaware Digital Right to Repair Act. Currently when an electronic product such as a phone or electronic game breaks, it is only allowed to be repaired by the manufacturer. Parts are not available whether you are a consumer or a local repair shop. This act requires the manufacturer to make parts, documentation, tools, and updates available on fair and reasonable terms. The genesis of these type of bills around the country began when John Deere made repairing its tractors impossible for farmers who own them. However, manufacturers often lobby to prevent these "fair and reasonable" terms.

Conservation

Plastic Free Delaware is an organization Working toward a First State

free of single use plastic pollution and a "Zero Waste First State." For more information and to get involved, visit their <u>website</u>.

Sussex County has a renamed conservation headquarters, **The Vanderwende-Evans Conservation Center**, named after two long-serving and influential members of the Sussex Conservation Board. Today the District implements conservation practices through our agriculture, stormwater, and heavy equipment programs.

- **Delaware Land Preservation Coalition** seeks \$25 million in new state open space funds. In the past, \$10 million was the annual investment but with the cost of land increasing, the buying power of that amount has decreased. Please contact your elected State officials to appropriate \$25 million before it is too late, and lands are lost to developers.
- Delaware's quiet conservationist: <u>Mt. Cuba</u>. Check out this clip from WHYY on Mt. Cuba's role in protecting wild lands in the First State.
- **Delaware Wild Lands** owns and manages over 21,600 acres of land on Delmarva, that is a big job for a small staff! Awareness Article

SNACK TIME

As you peruse your seed catalogs this winter, you might indulge in an occasional snack. I have a new taste sensation for you. Go into your wallet, take out a credit card, and start munching on it. Got your attention now don't I? As unbelievable as it sounds, you are probably already doing the equivalent of this.

Because of the proliferation of microplastics, it is estimated that we ingest a credit card's worth of plastic each week. Microplastics are in our food and water. Even organic products contain them. But what are microplastics and how have they become incorporated in our food?

Microplastics are small particles of plastic, the largest being the size of a rice grain and going down to microscopic sized. They are the result of the breakdown of plastic products and bags into smaller and smaller pieces. At each laundering, clothes incorporating polyester shed microscopic particles. All this eventually ends up in the environment.

As the plastic breaks into smaller and smaller pieces, it is ingested by fish who mistake it as food and animals as microscopic particles on their food. The smallest particles are actually picked up and incorporated into the tissues of vegetables and animals. Even organic food is not immune, as the particles are wind driven onto the organic farms.

While there is not much you can do to prevent existing microplastics from contaminating your food, you can prevent increased and future contamination. Avoid using plastic bags whenever possible. Purchase products in glass, paper or metal packaging, and if unavailable, purchase products that use as little plastic packaging as possible, and purchase larger sizes of plastic packaged products to decrease the amount of plastic per unit of product. Avoid polyester or polyester blend fabrics whenever possible, and launder on the gentlest cycle practical. It would also help to launder as infrequently as possible, but that is rather impractical. When an article of clothing is dirty, you have to clean it. All these actions will help reduce future microplastic contamination, and eventually reduce the amount of plastic ingested by us.

Reduce your use of plastic to reduce your ingestion of plastic. It's the healthy thing to do for yourself, your family, humanity in general and the environment. We're all in this together, so let's do something for the good of us all.
