Delaware Center for Horticulture (DCH)

The **Youth Environmental Summit!** (**YES!**) saw double the engagement from previous years, due to adding a more engaging tabling aspect (a test-your-tree-ID board). The staff also added more STEM horticulture learning at more of the events and enhanced the information that students can take home with them

Piloted programs with Forest Oak's 1st grade class received great feedback from the teachers:

- "This is incredible! This fits perfectly with our curriculum and class lessons. This
 program has been perfect!"
- "This [DCH] is such a hidden gem! I never would've thought to come here, but it's incredible!"

The Arbor Day Celebration at Rockwood Park with 200 students from Maple Lane and Mount Pleasant was the largest to date. A 5th station with a research group from Swarthmore College learning about children's perceptions of nature was added. Children then engaged in loose parts play with natural materials.

Because there was a student attending who uses a wheelchair, Rockwood investigated – and purchased – an off-roading wheelchair for future visitors of the park to use to better their accessibility. This was the first program at DCH (in recent years) with a group of students who will be using wheelchairs for a youth program at DCH.

In addition, there will be several upcoming Youth Environmental Summits over the summer with students/campers ranging in age from 6-18 years old (*Green Jobs Wilmington and Urban Promise Summer Camp*).

DCH will be piloting a new youth program called *Growing Gardeners*. The first event will be in August – All About Apples. This event will be 1 hour aimed at families with children between 4-9 years old. Storytime, snack, and educational nature-based activities are built around the same theme.



This has been DCH's most successful year teaching youth about horticulture – the STEM way! By Summer's end nearly 800 children will have begun to show nature helps us survive, helps with climate and our own well-being!

A Lovely Cactus Duo for the Holidays: Thanksgiving and Christmas

A Holiday Bloom with a Sub-tropical Origin

While many associate cacti with deserts, and understandably so, the Thanksgiving cactus (*Schlumbergera truncata*) and Christmas cactus (*Schlumbergera* × buckleyi) both evolved in the shady, subtropical rainforests of southeastern Brazil. There, they grow "epiphytically," perched in the forks of trees and "lithophytically", in rocky crevices — thriving in cool, humid environments under the forest canopy. Their shared natural habitat explains the need of filtered light and disdain for direct sun, making it a perfect plant for bright indoor spaces during our short winter days. There is also an Easter cactus (*Rhipsalidopsis gaertneri*) and I'll be featuring that in our April DFGC newsletter.

Distinguishing the "Holiday Cactus" Duo

The name "Thanksgiving Cactus" (TC) often gets muddled with its close cousin the "Christmas Cactus" (CC). However, the Thanksgiving cactus blooms as early as late October and as late as mid-November, hence its common name. The Christmas cactus blooms in mid to late December. Yet, when not in bloom, they can easily be discerned by the unique shape of their stem segments, known as phylloclades.

It is rather common to see the two species named incorrectly in stores since their bloom periods can be manipulated by how they are grown. Nursery suppliers do this in order to provide a "fresh, new" prolifically blooming product, for florists and grocery stores, over the several weeks leading up the holidays.

Photoperiod and Bloom Timing

As a short-day plant, Schlumbergera truncata initiates flower buds when nights exceed about 12 hours of darkness and temperatures hover between 55–65°F (13–18°C). For gardeners aiming to time the display for the holidays, providing uninterrupted dark nights for six to eight weeks is key. Even a few hours of artificial light can disrupt bud formation.

Once buds appear, plants should be kept in bright indirect light and moderate humidity — mimicking the conditions of their native forest canopy. Consistent watering without allowing the soil to dry completely, as well as misting with distilled water, helps the buds develop fully and prevents drop.

Cultural Care and Propagation

The Thanksgiving Cactus rewards steady care with years — even decades — of bloom. Key cultural notes include:

- Soil: Use a well-draining potting mix with organic matter, such as an fine-textured orchid or succulent blend amended with peat or composted bark.
- Water: Keep evenly moist while actively growing and budding, allowing the top inch of soil to dry between waterings.
 Misting every other day keeps the humidity high. Reduce watering slightly after flowering.
- · Fertilizer: Apply a balanced, diluted fertilizer monthly from spring through late summer.
- Repotting: Every 2–3 years, preferably in late winter after blooming.
- Propagation: Easily rooted from stem cuttings; a segment or two placed in damp mix will root within a few weeks.

A Legacy Plant

Few houseplants connect generations quite like the Thanksgiving Cactus. Many gardeners treasure family heirloom plants, passed down from grandparents and still blooming faithfully each autumn. This plant's enduring popularity lies not just in its ease of care and seasonal beauty, but in its ability to bridge horticulture, memory, and tradition.

DNREC updated the **Delaware Wildlife Action Plan for 2025-2035**. It is in draft form for public comment. Listed are Species of Greatest Need for Conservation (SGNC). This list includes animals, birds, fishes, invertebrates, herptiles, and, for the first time, **plants**. Tier 1 designation denotes those most in need of conservation.


Silver Pine Garden Club

Gary is the designer of Cape Henlopen State Park's Migratory Monarch Butterfly's Refueling Station and Education Pavilion. His work in the park is phase one of a larger coastal Delaware initiative called the Delaware Gold Coast.
