

Delaware Federation of Garden Club Life Membership is a recognition of Delaware garden club members to honor outstanding service to their communities, local clubs, or the state organization.



Gardeners by the Sea Garden Club sponsors Blue Star Memorial Marker in the Town of Bethany Beach



The Gardeners by the Sea Blue Star Memorial Marker wreath-laying ceremony was held on Saturday, November 9th, at 1:00 p.m. Gardeners by the Sea, in cooperation with the VFW Mason-Dixon Post 7234 and Auxiliary, and the Town of Bethany Beach, placed this Blue Star Memorial Marker close to the intersection of Kent Avenue and Garfield Parkway in Bethany Beach Park directly across the street from the Park now under construction.

A luncheon and Blue Star Memorial Marker Dedication was also held at 2:00 pm at the Ocean View Presbyterian Church Memorial Hall. This dedication was attended by our area State Representatives, VFW Mason-Dixon Post 7234 Officers, Board and Auxiliary. Also in attendance was the Mayor of Bethany Beach, our DFGC President, Connie Raymond, and Gardeners by the Sea Garden Club members. The Blue Star Memorial Highway Program is a program that honors all men and women that serve in the United States Armed Services. This program began with the planting of 8,000 Dogwood trees by the New Jersey Council of Garden Clubs in 1944

as a living memorial to veterans of World War II. In 1945, the National Council of State Garden Clubs adopted this program and began a Blue Star Highway system that covers thousands of miles across the

Continental United States, Alaska, and Hawaii. A large metal Blue Star Memorial Highway Marker is placed at appropriate locations along the way.

What we see today is a program that has expanded to include all men and women who had served, are serving or would serve in the armed services of the United States. Memorial Markers and By-Way markers were added to the Highway Markers, to be used at locations such as National cemeteries, parks, veteran's facilities, and gardens.

The Blue Star Memorial Markers are named for the blue star in the service flag. It became an icon in World War II and was seen

on flags and banners in homes for sons and daughters away at war, and in churches and businesses. This program has been active all through the years to the present, a fitting tribute to our Armed Forces.

Eighteen club members met at three full day "workshops" to design and create more than I 20 handmade ornaments. 
MIDDLETOWN-ODESSA GARDEN CLUB
